"My administration is also focused on expanding access to high-quality, affordable childcare. Last year, I was proud to sign into law the largest ever increase in Child Care Development Block Grants to States. The States understand that very well. "Unfortunately, childcare, again, remains too expensive for too many families in our nation. In some places, childcare can cost almost \$20,000 per child per year. Low-income families often spend one third — one third of their yearly income on childcare, more than they spend on their rent or mortgage. REPRESENTATIVE DON BACON



Since 2020, Rep. Bacon has voted for legislation that helped working families access child care including:

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act which delivered \$3.5 billion in supplemental funding to the Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) program, including bringing in \$20,077,074 to <u>support</u> Nebraska child care providers.

Since 2020, Rep. Bacon has voted against legislation that helped working families access child care including:

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 <u>which supported</u> more than 225,00 child care providers serving as many as 10 million children, <u>including</u> 2,270 Nebraska child care programs, impacting up to 103,700 children.

The CHIPS and Science Act which <u>required</u> employers seeking Commerce Department grants to guarantee affordable, quality child care.

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Representative Bacon has supported and led legislation that would reduce the cost of child care for Nebraska's working families, including:

 H.R. 6056: More Child Care and Jobs for Military Families Act, Co-Sponsor
H.R. 7720: Helping Child Care Providers Respond to the Coronavirus Public Health Emergency Act , Co-Sponsor
H.R. 2722: Providing Child Care for Police Officers Act of 2023, Co-Sponsor



Since 2023, **Rep. Bacon has supported Appropriations bills which included more than \$164 million in assistance** to child care and programs for Nebraska families.



REPRESENTATIVE BACON ON THE NEED TO SUPPORT CHILD CARE FOR WORKING FAMILIES



In 2024, Rep. Bacon <u>spoke</u> about the critical need for child care to support America's military families in a House Armed Services Committee Quality of Life Panel Hearing with Senior Enlisted Leaders. "Making sure service members have access to child care is not just about supporting military families, it is a key element in ensuring the readiness of our armed forces. We can't afford to overlook this service."



In 2021, Rep. Bacon <u>posted</u> on Twitter about his work with The Problem Solver's Caucus to help maintain employment during the pandemic and support child care providers. "The Problem Solvers Caucus (25Rs & 25Ds) and I drafted the bipartisan #COVID relief bill to add more funding for the unemployment [...] our goal was to keep people employed. We put money towards our K-12 schools, child care providers, low income housing & live venues."
